THE CLOSET SCENE

Ha! have you eyes? You cannot call it love; for at your age The hey-day⁹ in the blood is tame, it's humble, And waits upon the judgment: and what judgment Would step from this to this? Sense¹⁰, sure, you have, Else could you not have motion; but sure, that sense Is apoplex'd11; for madness would not err, Nor sense to ecstasy was ne'er so thrall'd But¹² it reserved some quantity of choice, To serve in such a difference¹³. What devil was't That thus hath cozen'd you at hoodman-blind¹⁴? Eyes without feeling, feeling without sight, Ears without hands or eyes, smelling sans all¹⁵, Or but a sickly part of one true sense Could not so mope¹⁶. O shame! where is thy blush?
