STUDENTS


- Gain pragmatic skills for critical reading and thinking



As if alive. »



«[...] like he used to go for Harry and Ernest, because she was a girl; but latterly he had begun to threaten her and say what he would do to her only for her dead mother's grave.»






Sally Rooney, Normal People, 2018

- « In one motion he moves his hand down from her shoulder and squeezes the flesh of her right breast, in front of everyone. [...] Her eyes are stinging and she feels a pain where he grabbed her. »
- « Well, she likes to beat me up. Just during sex, that is. »
- « Marianne is not allowed to talk or make eye contact while the game is going on. If she breaks the rules, she gets punished later. He tells her bad things about herself. [...] She experiences a depression so deep it is tranquilizing, she eats whenever he tells her to eat. »
- « Alan lifts his arm and throws the bottle at her. It smashes behind her on the tiles. [...] she manages to make it into her room [...], before he catches up. He tries the handle and she has to strain to keep it from turning. Then he kicks the outside of the door. »

Covid-19 Lockdown: statistics

- In the first three weeks of lockdown, abuses and feminicides ha increased by 20% in all 193 countries of the United Nations;
- Depending on the possible recurrence of the lockdown, this year the increase of domestic violence cases could be between 15 and 31 million
- In Great Britain, police had arrested over 4 thousands people accused of domestic abuse and calls to the National Domestic Violence Hotline has increased by 49% in the first six weeks of lockdown
- Between January and February in Mexico, feminicides increased by 9,1% compared to 2019
- In New York, China, Malaysia, Turkey and Lebanon, abuses increased by 30% in April
- In the next 10 years, there could be an increase by about 2 million of cases of feminine genital mutilations;
- In the next 10 years, there could be an increase by about 13 million of marriage between children;
- There has been a lack of help and social support due to the lockdown.
