Research Paper

Your finished paper should be a **presentation of your own** thinking backed up by the ideas or information of others in the field.

A paper can be:

ANALYTICAL that is using evidence to analyze facets of an issue

ARGUMENTATIVE that is uses evidence to attempt to convince the reader of your particular stance on a debatable topic.

The choice of one of the two types will determine the **purpose of** the paper you are going to write.

"To analyze means to break a topic or a concept down into its parts in order to inspect and understand it, and to restructure those parts in a way that makes sense to you".

In an analytical research paper, you do research to become an **expert on a topic** so that you can restructure and present the parts of the topic from your own perspective.

In this brand of research paper you go into the researching stage with a specific topic about which you have not made any kind of conclusions.

This is often called a **research question**.

Your task is to survey the information and views already out there both **before** and **once you become familiar with the topic**. That will require **critical thinking and reading plus evaluation** of the **resources** you may decide to handle.
