PREFACE TO LYRICAL BALLADS

The Preface to Lyrical Ballads is considered the manifesto of Romanticism, where William Wordsworth explains what the new form of poetry should be like. The text can be divided into four sections:

- The content of poetry
- The language of poetry
- The identity of the poet
- The definition of poetry

The content of poetry

- Poetry should deal with:
 - situations from simple rustic life and this should be transfigured by imagination.
- The aim of poetry should be:
 - to make the incidents of common life interesting.
- Romantics were interested in:

the relation between the mind and the natural world.

The language of poetry

- Poetry should use:
 - familiar simple language "The language really used by men"
- Poets should:
 - fit the real language of men to metrical arrangement and take it from men in a vivid sensation

The identity of the poet

- The poet is a man speaking to men
- The poets is more lively sensibily, with a greater knowledge of human nature, a more comprehensive soul
- The poet is better than ordinary men
- The poet is pleased with his own passions and wills
- The poet contemplates wills and passions in the Universe

The definition of poetry

- Wordsworth's definition of poetry is: *"the sponeous overflow of powerful feelings".*
- Poetry is origined from emotion recollected in tranquillity.
 The aim of poetry is pleasure.
