

Unità d'Italia square is the main square in Trieste, a seaport city in northeast of Italy. Located at the foot of the hill with the castle of San Giusto, the square faces the Adriatic Sea. It is often said to be Europe's largest square located next to the sea. The square was built during the period when Trieste was the most important seaport of the Austrian-Hungarian Empire and includes the city's Town Hall.



A few steps from the Unità d'Italia square there is the Molo Audace with a breathtaking view of the Adriatic Sea, the spectacular sunsets that seems to dive into the water and turn the buildings of the square red and the city center. During the Barcolana it is filled with beautiful boats.



In Trieste you can visit a wonderful castle called "**Miramare Castel**" located in the north of the city, on the gulf of the same name. The Archduke Ferdinand Maximilian of Habsburg and his partner Carlotta of Belgium lived in the castle. Its grounds include an extensive cliff and seashore park of 22 hectares designed by the Archduke. You can also visit the inside of the castle where, on the ground floor you can see the apartments of the royal couple.



Anyone passing by Trieste should visit the **Risiera of San Sabba**. It's a five-storey brick-built compound, that was used during World War II as a Nazi concentration camp for detention and political prisoners, and a transit camp for Jews. You can remember what the prisoners had to face, through videos, testimonies and finds if you go there.
