## Working in the UK

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The UK – and London in particular – is an attractive destination for foreign employees and global companies. With the country's diverse work sectors, good working conditions and numerous employment opportunities it's no surprise that the UK attracts international

graduates wanting to start their careers.

Most foreign nationals1 have one advantage over their British colleagues or competitors. They are fluent in at least one foreign language. This is an important factor if you consider working in the UK. There is always a high demand for speakers of foreign languages, from engineers to teachers, from local government officials to sales

nersonnel.

There are approximately 30 million people aged 16 and over who are currently employed in the UK. London is the place where most people working in the UK end up. Europe's financial capital attracts a lot of international business, and most multinational companies have a London branch.

### Permits and qualifications for working in the UK

Despite the demand for foreign languages, English remains an essential requirement for most people working in the UK. If you need a permit for working in the UK, English language skills are mandatory2. To work in the UK you will need a current UK work visa. There are a variety of UK working visas, work permits and passports that enable you to legally work in the UK and each has its own characteristics and restrictions. A good way to start is to contact the nearest embassy.

7 process plant: factory where special methods serve to treat materials, especially one where food is treated in order to preserve it. A process operator is a person who supervises the operations in a plant.

#### Finding a job in the UK

There are a number of recommended sources for those keen on<sup>3</sup> working in the UK. 'The Guardian' newspaper is the best source for skilled job seekers in the UK. All big and reputable companies, especially those who want to reach an international audience, advertise their vacancies in 'The Guardian'. It dedicates several pages to different fields of employment on certain days of the week, e.g. media jobs on one day, vacancies in the public sector on another. In addition, it offers an extensive, nationwide online job database searchable by anyone with an interest in working in the UK. As in most countries, the Internet in general is a valuable tool for job seekers. If you are merely looking for a local part-time job, a good place to check is the notice board of your local library. Also, for people considering working in the UK for a

limited period of time, registering with recruitment agencies specializing in temporary jobs, is often the way forward.
